

Request for Public Feedback Clam Farm Caretakers Residence

It is hereby notified for public information and comment that Council has received an application from Mr John Clunies-Ross, a West Island resident, seeking the approval of Council to develop a caretaker's residence at the Clam Farm.

The proponent has advised that the dwelling will not be used by him, instead it will be by a person that is employed part time at the Clam Farm. The Cocos (Keeling) shire town planning scheme, allows council to approve caretakers dwellings on general rural zoned land subject to advertising. Changes to the R codes has allowed for an increase from 60m2 to a maximum 70m2 habitable space. The limitation of only 1 bedroom has also been removed.

The Shire has previously required that the "applicant for a caretakers dwelling is to give a written undertaking that the Caretaker's dwelling is not to be used for any other purpose than for the sole occupancy for the applicant, it shall not be sublet, or leased to any other person for any other use whatsoever. However, should the applicant intend being off island for an extended period of time, the dwelling may be occupied by another person providing approval is requested and given (in writing) by Council" and seeks the community views on whether this restriction should be removed and / or altered and under what conditions.

Written comments regarding the proposal must be submitted to the Council on or before COB Friday 11th September 2015.

SEATBELTS AND KIDS ON COCOS ISLANDS

Police would like to take the opportunity to reinforce the message regarding the use of seatbelts and child restraints in motor vehicles driven in the Cocos Keeling Islands. Whenever children are passengers in any vehicle they should be seated in the most appropriate child restraint for their age and size.

From birth up to the age of 6 months to be restrained in a rearward facing approved child car restraint (e.g. infant capsule). Must not travel in the front seat of a vehicle that has a back row or rows of seats.

- From 6 months up to 4 years to be restrained in either a rearward or forward facing approved child car restraint with in-built harness. Must not travel in the front seat of a vehicle that has a back row or rows of seats.
- From 4 years up to 7 years to be restrained in either a forward facing approved child car restraint or approved booster seat restrained by a correctly adjusted and fastened seat belt or child safety harness. May travel in the front seat only if all the other back seats are occupied by children who are also under 7 years of age.
- Over the age of 7 years can be restrained in an adult seat belt or in an approved booster seat.

All adults must wear seatbelts at all times when travelling in a motor vehicle.

You cannot share a seatbelt with another passenger. It is extremely dangerous to carry a child on a passengers lap with a seatbelt around both.

The Cocos Conundrum

Very few of the present and past residents and tourists to Cocos would be unaware of the 9th of November 1914 WW2 saga of the battle between Germany's SMS *Emden* and the newly fledged Australian light cruiser HMAS *Sydney*. However as an enthusiast of Cocos history and where I thought I had seen most photographs of that event, in fact all, just recently doing a casual searches of web sites another batch turned up making me ponder just who was the photographer. Possibly a great many were taken by the late Cosmo Clunies Ross who on the 10th of November 1914 was invited to head to North Keeling to assist the navigation of HMAS *Sydney* because of his familiarity with the general coastline of that tiny atoll.


One thing leads to another though and whilst most of the facets of the battle are well known and have received extensive coverage in books and subsequent ceremonies as the newly fledged Australian Navy's first ever naval victory what is lesser known and has received virtually no publicity is the darker side of the victory. That is whilst the *living* German crew members were evacuated on the 10th of November virtually all of the 134 deceased German crew members remained aboard the stricken *Emden* and Britain's SMS *Cadmus* was assigned the task of disposing of the dead.

Firstly though the *Cadmus* had to sail from Hong Kong and arriving at North Keeling Island a few days later an unimaginable scene of horror greeted that vessels crew as the *Emden's* lifeless had been exposed for several days in the Cocos tropical weather. By then there was simply no way by then for the deceased crew to be respectfully removed and interred on North Keeling leaving the only option to slide the remains overboard with many being devoured by sharks.




The question perhaps remains why this mission was not carried out by one of the 3 escort vessels accompanying the fleet to the Middle East and the simple answer is the risk was simply too great as their prime task was to ensure the safety of the 38 merchant vessels transporting almost 30,000 troops of whom early the following year, formed part of the disastrous Gallipoli campaign.

Just imagine if the *Emden* had even the faintest indication that fleet was so close to Cocos the potential loss of life on these could have evolved into one of the greatest tragedies ever recorded in war time history. By the 9th November 1914 the Emden had been involved in 31 encounters and as such a <u>number</u> that had never before, or since, been exceeded by a single vessel in naval history although tonnage has certainly been greatly exceeded. Moreover by that time the German crew were highly skilled whilst many of convoys' merchant ships were old, unarmed and extremely





A century has now passed since that event and in the week around the 9th November 2014, a mix of descendants and friends of the Emden Family in Germany plus other people from other locations, many from Australia, joined together in centennial services on Cocos. The 10th of November was devoted to a trip to North Keeling Island when a number of wreaths were dropped overboard just beyond the last resting place of the *Emden*.





The fruition though, and deserving special mention, was the wonderful input from the students and staff of the West Island School with of course huge participation from a mix of official and non official sources and numbers of Cocos residents.

Pictured left are constructions of wire replicas of HMAS *Sydney* & SMS *Emden*, enlarged poppies, with services in the school area providing a superb setting. The lead up to the week of services involved dozens of people on Cocos for which each every participant can be justifiably proud.

Fish for the future

Department of Fisheries update: Coral Trout under review, Kim on-island

Following recent field research, the Western Australian Department of Fisheries is aware of the recovery of populations of coral trout (*Plectropomus areolatus*) at Cocos (Keeling) Islands (CKI). In finfish surveys carried out from 2001 – 2010, coral trout were recorded in very low numbers, but in surveys carried out by the Department in 2014 and 2015, large numbers of coral trout were found across a diverse range of habitats. Feedback from local community members supports this research and large individual coral trout have been observed being caught by local fishers.

The recovery of coral trout at CKI raised some questions for scientists from the Department of Fisheries, including why did the coral trout return? and where did they come from? To start to investigate the latter, samples of coral trout tissue were collected and are in the process of being analysed as part of a wider study. Initial results reveal that the coral trout population at CKI is closely related to the Maldives population and they are genetically distinct from the Western Australian and Pacific Ocean populations.

Recreational fishing rules will be introduced to CKI in early 2016. Under the proposed legislation, coral trout will be a protected species and may not be taken. Due to their recent reappearance, however, the Department is considering introducing a conservative bag limit for coral trout at CKI. A bag limit is the amount of fish (coral trout in this case) that each person can catch per day. Although coral trout have returned to CKI and are abundant at the moment they are susceptible to over-fishing, and this species will need to be treated carefully to ensure that they remain at CKI into the future.

Community Education Officer for the IOTs, Kim Boothman, will be on-island from 5th-12th September. She will have a stall at the market day on September 12th to be held at the Community Resource Centre and invites the community to come and grab a copy of the recreational fishing guide for Cocos (Keeling) Islands. Kim will also continue the schools-based education program with students from Cocos (Keeling) District High School during her trip.

Berita Department of Fisheries: Gelek Burik dalam pemeriksaan, Kim berada dipulu

Selepas pemeriksaan, Western Australian Department of Fisheries mengetahui tentang jumlah pembaruan gelek burik (Plectropomus areolatus) di Pulu Cocos (Keeling). Dalam survey ikan dijalankan dari 2001 – 2010, gelek burik didaftarkan dalam jumlah yang sangat sedikit dalam berbagai tempat tinggal. Pandangan daripada memba-memba dari masyarakat menyokongkan penyelidikkan ini dan gelek burik yang besar-besar telah dilihat terdapat daripada pemancing kita dipulu.

Pembaruan gelek burik di CKI menimbulkan soalan untuk scientist-scientist dari Department of Fisheries, temasuk kenapa gelek burik ini kembali? dan darimana mereka datang? Untuk bermula menyelidik soalan yang akhir ini, sampel-sampel daripada gelek burik dikumpulkan dan dalam proses untuk di mengalinilisa dalam sebahgian pengkajian yang luas. Hasil awal-awal ini menunjukkan yang jumlah gelek burik di CKI rapat persaudaraannya dengan jumlah yang berada di Maldives dan mereka berlainan secara genetic daripada jumlah yang berada di Australia Barat da Lautan Pacific.

Undang-undang pemancingan rekreasi akan mula diperkenalkan di CKI pada awal 2016. Menurut undang-undang dicadangkan, gelek burik akan menjadi jenis yang terjaga dan tidak boleh diambil. Tetapi olehkerana kemunculan kembali, Department sedang pertimbangkan untuk meletakkan 'bag limit' jumlah gelek burik yang boleh diamcil di CKI. 'Bag limit' adalah jumlah ikan (dalam kes ini gelek burik) yang stiap orang boleh ambil seharian. Walaupun gelek burik telah kembali ke CKI dan sedang banyak dimasa sekarang, mereka juga boleh keterlaluan diambil, dan jenis ini akan perlu dijaga dengan baik untuk memastikan mereka senantiasa berada di CKI hingga kemasa hadapan.

Opisa Pendidikan Masyarakat untuk IOT, Kim Boothman, akan berada dipulu dari 5^{nb}-12^{nb} September. Dia akan mengadakan stall di market day pada September 12^{nb} yang akan diadakan di Community Resource Centre dan menjumput masyarakat untuk datang dan mengambil salinan buku pemancingan rekreasi untuk Pulu Cocos (Keeling). Kim juga akan menerusi program pendidikan dalam sekolah dengan murid-murid dari Cocos (Keeling) District High School dimasa pelawatannya.

Exposure to chlorine gas can cause coughing, shortness of breath, chest pain, nausea, or other symptoms.
- 2. Ammonia is often included in glass cleaners and other hard-surface cleaners, and can be irritating to the skin, eyes, throat, and lungs. Ammonia can burn your skin, and can damage your eyes (including blindness) upon contact.
- 3. Triclosan and Triclocarban are commonly added to household cleaning products such as hand soap and dish soap as well as a broad range of other products from toothpaste to socks. These chemicals are persistent in the environment, and are linked to hormone imbalance, and potential increased risk of breast cancer.


